




Signature of seabed arms control treaty, February 1971

Some people complain that membership of the Common Market would cost the British housewife more.

What they don't say is how much greater
will be the prospects for her
husband to earn more —
the economic advantages leading
to greater wealth for Britain
and more money in wage packets.

Some people say the cost of food will rise substantially if Britain joins. What they don't say is that the additional rise in

living costs is likely to be under 1/2 per cent a year for five years.

Some people say that membership would make life tough on families. What they don't say is that standards of living in all Common Market countries have been rising much faster than in Britain — in some cases, almost three times as fast.











1970s board game about finding oil in the North Sea




By 1972, 73% of households had fridges. By 1980, 92%




Trade union density in the United Kingdom from 1900 to 2000

Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty


May 26, 1972 – Moscow – Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev and U.S. President Richard Nixon, meeting in Moscow, sign the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) agreements. At the time, these agreements were the most far-reaching attempts to control nuclear weapons ever. A number of agreed statements were also made. This helped improve relations between the United States and the USSR. SALT I froze the number of strategic ballistic missile launchers at existing levels and provided for the addition of new submarine-launched ballistic missile (SLBM) launchers only after the same number of older intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) and SLBM launchers had been dismantled. 
